- I. The meeting was called to order at 12:04 by Chair Bowersox-Johnson.
- II. Roll Call – Determine Quorum
- III. Approve Agenda: Bogan moved to approve agenda, Alkalimat seconded. The motion passed by voice vote.

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Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for motion to accept correspondence and keep it on file. Halenar moved to accept correspondence, Resnick seconded. Motion passed by voice vote.

VI. * Action/Discussion Items:

Jeff Hamilton, of the Information Technologies department at the City of Champaign, announced that the City of Champaign is hosting a Digital Divide Resource Fair. The event will be on Monday, October 22, 2012 from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Douglass Branch Library. They are inviting the public, UC2B Policy Board, and anyone to whom they can spread the word to attend in order to learn about computing centers within the community (houses of worship, libraries, and other places that house computing centers). They want to share these resources with the public, including training classes at Parkland that are free of charge. Comcast, UC2B will be present talking about offering services to help bridge the digital divide.

Chair Bowerox-Johnson asked for more information.

Hamilton said there are booths available from 4:00 – 7:00. Starting at about 5:00 there will be short presentations where an agency can stand in front of the audience to make a brief presentation. Hamilton handed out fliers for the event to Committee members. Chair Bowersox-Johnson said this information is on the website as well.

a) IRU Agreement Template (12:05)

Stavins said there has been talk with initial IRU purchasers, starting with Champaign Telephone Company (CTC) who is also representing the school district. He said the IRU template has been put to good use, and all terms and agreements have largely been negotiated. He anticipates the first IRU being finalized next week, or maybe even later this week. He wants to bring one item though regarding the template before Policy Committee prior to finalizing. He believes an item having to do with the default section deviates more from the template than is fairly contemplated. CTC is in a unique position because they are installing on behalf of others. They have requested as part of the agreement that UC2B guarantee a particular availability date and provide for a financial penalty provision if it is not done by this date. This is a penalty provision, and is typical in a construction agreement. Stavins believes there is no reason to object to this because he believes UC2B can meet this date. The provision amounts to about \$3,000 per month: enough so that it catches people's attention, but not so much that it is unreasonable. His recommendation is that UC2B go forward with the provision. Because this is not a concept inherent in the agreement, Stavins wants to relay this to Policy Committee before going forward. This is the last piece of the agreement with CTC. Stavins held out the option that he wouldn't have to go to the Committee if the provision was not included, but CTC wants it included. If the Policy Committee objects, Stavins can go back into negotiations. He asked for a short poll from Committee.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for questions from Policy Committee.



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Resnick asked what CTC was getting an IRU for. Stavins asked for Smeltzer to answer these questions.

Smeltzer asked if the date was still mid-December. Stavins said yes. Everything is not spliced yet and lateral fibers do not yet exist. Smeltzer said they paid to have specifics - CTC is paying for backbone fiber and for a set of laterals. Smeltzer says we are confident the penalty won't come into play, as we anticipate being done by 12/15. They (CTC) want assurances that it will get done; this ensures that it does.

Stavins said this is a common element in IRUs that involve construction, but because the concept was not in the original template, he felt compelled to come before the Committee.

Resnick said he was surprised that CTC was getting specific laterals as part of the IRU in addition to backbone. Smeltzer said all people who are getting IRUs specify certain places they want to connect. Certain locations are built in to IRUs and are prepaid for. That is across the board for everyone.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for more questions.

Halenar asked who would be paying the penalty. Smeltzer said the grant would not pay a penalty. This is operational and would have to come out of operational funds.

DeJarnette asked if this is just about getting splicing done. Smeltzer said the fiber itself is referred to as "the system."

DeJarnette said this is less a penalty but more of a tool to make sure UC2B gets things done. Stavins agreed.

DeJarnette wondered if this would penalize us on the backend in terms of getting things done. Smeltzer said curb connections were done Phase I, but some had been moved to Phase II. DeJarnette is concerned about this.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for clarification – is doing this by 12/15 going to stop UC2B from connecting 1000 people?

Smeltzer said Phase I contractors want to be gone by 12/15.

DeJarnette said some of this is Phase II. Smeltzer said Phase II is running well ahead. Resnick asked where the 12/15 date came from. Feinen asked about incentives to encourage the contractors to meet specific deadlines.

Stavins said the first incentive is that UC2B gets the second part of CTC's IRU payment. When the agreement is done, they pay the first half of funds. The second half of the payment is paid after we are done.



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Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for further questions, and audience input. There was none.

Bowerox-Johnson asked for a quick motion in support of the change requested by Stavins. He asked if the motion could be direction for staff to proceed.

Halenar moved to proceed with the penalty clause as presented.

DeJarnette asked for input from Shive-Hattery prior to approving motion.

Paul Duke from Shive-Hattery said there are a lot of competing priorities. We are trying to assemble them into package that will get us to the end. This request is in line with a path that UC2B is already on and Duke sees no issue with making that date, barring the unforeseen.

Resnick rephrased the question: whether you make this date, does putting in this date make you worry about other pieces of the project

Duke said the short answer is no.

Resnick asked for clarification.

Duke reiterated that there are competing priorities and the construction teams are juggling them. This IRU refers to Phase I work, which must be completed before CTC needs their hookup. Duke does not see it as an additional burden. The overall project schedule is a challenge.

Resnick asked if this challenges the overall schedule. Duke said no.

Dejarnette seconded the motion.

Feinen asked if it was okay that we did this as a motion instead of a poll.

Stavins agreed and reiterated that he just wanted to bring this to Policy Committee before moving forward. He said he thought Champaign's IRU would be easy.

The motion to proceed with the penalty clause as presented was approved by voice vote.

b) Dual Representation Consent (12:20)

Stavins said that he represents the City of Champaign, but he is also representing UC2B. Ethically he is on both sides of the IRU negotiation. He needs the Policy Committee's consent to represent UC2B to arrive at an IRU agreement with the City of Champaign. The City Manager can give him consent to represent the City of



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Champaign. UC2B could hire an outside attorney if the Committee deems that necessary. One potential issue with dual representation is that there could be competing interests, but Stavins does not believe this to be the case in this situation. He expects it to be neutral for both UC2B and the City of Champaign.

Bowerox-Johnson asked for a motion giving consent for Stavins to represent UC2B.

Bogan asked how long the agreement would be with Stavins. Stavins said the IRU is a contract between the City of Champaign and UC2B. The City of Champaign is acting as trustee for three bodies that make up UC2B. So, the City of Champaign is acting as the lead agency, but is on both sides of this transaction. The City is a member of the Policy Committee, and Stavins represents UC2B, but he also represents the City. When someone represents both sides everyone involved needs to know. There is no matter of disclosure here, but there is a matter of consent.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson clarified to Bogan that this is not a permanent decision for Stavins to be the UC2B attorney forever or indefinitely, but rather that this approval is for this specific transaction.

Resnick said he has no real problem with Stavins negotiating this contract. However, given the potential for conflict of interest, Resnick asked about having the Urbana and UIUC legal departments sign off on it.

Stavins said that was a possibility.

Resnick said this would remove any conflict of interest. Stavins said that sounds like a good suggestion.

DeJarnette said there are positive advantages to this, and from the Urbana perspective, he believes they would likely use the Champaign template for the City of Urbana.

Stavins said this is a good check, and this is why it is important to stick to the template. There are clarifications and amplifications of certain points to make the agreement clearer. This will make it into all the agreements.

Alkalimat asked about Stavins acting in this capacity even beyond the end of the federal grant period – the three entities will have to agree on a permanent organizational structure of UC2B. He said he would have no problem having Stavins be the UC2B attorney until then under the same basis. He said the Committee should assume that this will be presented to them again, and perhaps should function until there is a solid date of a new organizational structure.

Legner said it is premature to discuss this in detail. There was a meeting last week to discuss organizational structure since Urbana has now approved the Business Plan. In that meeting, important components of what that organization should hold to were



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identified. There is a meeting this afternoon with outside attorneys to begin crafting that structure and bylaws. There is progress, but when an organization is created it takes time to get up and running, and the date of creation may not be indicative of when the operational changes actually begin to take place.

Technical Questions:

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for final technical questions. There were none.

Audience Participation:

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked He asked for public participation. There was none.

The motion would be granting dual representation so that Stavins can represent both UC2B and City of Champaign.

Resnick motioned to have Stavins represent UC2B in contract negotiations, with the caveat that Urbana and University legal sign off on this to alleviate any conflict of interest.

Bogan seconded.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for final comments/questions.

Motion passed.

c) RFI for Infrastructure Expansion Status (12:30)

Legner said we had received five (5) responses to the original RFI by 9/11/2012. Shortly thereafter, there was at least one announcement/press release of another public-private partnership that had occurred in Oregon. Joanne Hovis, UC2B's consultant for expansion, suggested that UC2B look at that company and perhaps others, and as such the RFI was reopened and will remain so until 10/26/2012. The idea is for UC2B to enhance its ability to negotiate and have a more comprehensive set of opportunities to consider.

There is an RFI review panel comprised of members from each UC2B agency. There was a conversation with one RFI respondent yesterday, 10/09/2012. There have been twelve (12) new downloads of the expanded opportunity, including one company that has partnered in Oregon. There has been a tentative discussion of using a qualifications-based selection process, as it will be a negotiation.

Resnick asked what a qualifications-based process is.

Legner said it is like hiring a professional architect. It is not strictly an RFP or a bid. It is hiring someone who is mutually agreed upon as the best choice to meet UC2B's goals. Legner said there is hope of continuing discussions with the company who was talked with yesterday, 10/09/2012, although there has not yet been a debriefing from



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that meeting. Time will tell in the next 2.5 weeks what kind of response is received, and more information can be provided at that time.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for Committee questions. There were none.

Legner reiterated that the RFI is open until 10/26/2012, so anyone can encourage companies to respond. She said it was re-sent to everyone it had been sent to initially, including AT&T and Comcast. Legner asked that everyone please forward the link on to anyone who might want to see it.

Audience Participation:

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for public participation. There was none.

d) Community Benefit Fund (12:40)

Alkalimat said there is a community forum planned for 12/01/2012. There is a series of meetings in the community to create interest and focus a discussion on the state of UC2B and the future. There are several community initiatives that are important and will have an impact. He specifically wanted to mention the local Wiki. There is an application for local Wiki technologies. There is one developed for Champaign-Urbana. Students at GSLIS have been participating, and there are 1000 entries already. He believes it should be a goal to make this more public and available. It is an opportunity for people in the community to have representation without having a website. It is at the technical level of Facebook, making it user-friendly. He hopes that at the 12/01/2012 meeting there will be full participation with UC2B to give feedback to community but also to represent activities that the Committee and UC2B think will become best practices.

He wants to know what kind of initiatives the Community Benefit Fund can impact in the community as a whole, and what kind of grants can be discussed. On one hand, community-wide grants should be addressed. But there should also be discussion of individual organizational/entities grants. He hopes to provide a written report at the next Policy Committee meeting, and to set the stage for 12/01/2012 meeting.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson said there is a flier for this on the UC2B website. It starts at 9:00 a.m. and goes until 1:00 p.m.

Alkalimat said there was a digital divide lecture series on campus and there was a fascinating presentation today from Urbana Fire Chief about the transformation into the digital realm. Every institution is making this transition. With the digital divide for staff and in the community, this is an example of how what is done with UC2B will impact the overall quality of life. Here, with firefighting, this is literally life or death. Alkalimat encourages everyone to look at the video. Everything is transforming. They are facing issues of what happens to older firefighters, how to create new requirements for new firefighters, and so on. This is a chief who has been there for 40 years and this helps us on the ground as we create policy.



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Audience Participation:

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for discussion, and public input. There was none

e) NTIA and Grant Report (1:00)

Chair Bowersox-Johnson mentioned an email that came out this week with Smeltzer's full report. It was inadvertently left out of the original Policy Committee packet which was sent 10/05/2012.

Smeltzer mentioned the NATOA conference where UC2B was honored as the Community Broadband Project of the Year.

UC2B is moving forward with the Solix call center contract, as it was approved by the Champaign City Council. Solix is tentatively set to start fielding calls 11/07/2012. When subscribers call for support, they will talk to Solix at that point.

Legner said there are meetings happening about the 501c3 organizational structure.

It was pointed out that there was never officially an approval of Private VLAN pricing. No one is signed up for it currently, so it affects no one. But an organization in the community might (ie. Carle) want a private network.

Resnick asked if he could ask technical question.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson told him to wait.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for other questions for Smeltzer about grant update.

Alkalimat said it should take a moment to recognize that we have national visibility, which points to success of Legner and Smeltzer and others who have been going to conferences. It is paying off, and he wanted to recognize Smeltzer.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson said there are pictures and video of Smeltzer's acceptance of the award on the UC2B facebook page. People in Washington who are involved with advocacy are recognizing UC2B. We are doing something that is way ahead of the curve for cities in America. UC2B is a model, making it imperative that it be done well to help other towns learn from it. This is exciting.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for any other comments. There were none.

f) * Resolution 2012-24 A Resolution Establishing Private Virtual Local Area Network (VLAN) Pricing (1:10)

Chair Bowersox-Johnson mentioned where the resolution was in packet and asked for further introduction from Smeltzer.



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Smeltzer said it was originally communicated to NTIA that UC2B would offer this as a service. Windstream and AT&T offer this, though it is all called something different. Even Comcast offers it. It is sometimes called “Metro Ethernet”. It only connects these locations to each other. They are not connected to internet.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked what is the difference between this kind of connection and the anchor institution connection for a place like Carle? Would it not be as easy for facilities to “talk” to each other over a standard UC2B \$20 connection?

Smeltzer said because banks and medical facilities have different requirements in terms of sensitivity of their data, Private VLAN may be preferential to using the internet. Over the internet, data would flow everywhere. With a private VLAN, the connection is only with their own facilities. This is generally accepted as secure way for these types of institutions to do business.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked if this takes more staff time.

Smeltzer said this is market-based pricing as opposed to what it costs to do it. Busey, for example, could hook up connections to different speeds and come back to main hub. No one may ever want to do this. For example, if school districts hadn’t purchased their own fiber, they may have wanted to do this. They could be both – both UC2B internet customers and private VLAN customers.

Resnick said it was virtual Ethernet. Banks and hospitals would want it simply so that even UC2B staff could not look at that data, which they could in the VLAN case. Resnick said he is unclear on what this gains anyone as customers of ours to have us control their VLAN. It seems like more work for not a whole lot of bang for their buck. He said he does not object to this on principle but it seems like more work for UC2B.

Smeltzer you could do VPN, whereas this lets them plug Ethernet in and trust us with their information.

Resnick asked Stavins as far as UC2B goes are we considered a common carrier, and do we have the same protections, and would we be exonerated from liability? Stavins said he doesn’t know.

Resnick said we are in same boat as AT&T. We should pass this resolution so we can say this is how much we would charge IF we did this, but we should look into it to see if we should actually offer it.

Audience Participation:

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for audience input.

Peter Folk, 1407 S. Maple St. Urbana said in response to Resnick that ISPs are not common carriers. They are not covered by those protections. This is a matter of telecommunications versus ISPs. Anybody who cares about security would probably do VPN.



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Chair Bowerox-Johnson asked for further public input. There was none.

Halenaar moved to accept resolution 2012-24 for Establishment of Private Virtual Local Area Network Rates. Resnick seconded. No discussion. Resolution passed by voice vote.

Resnick asked that we look into whether people will be interested in this and what potential liabilities are.

g) Canvassing/Customer Acquisition Update (1:20)

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for input from LaEisha Meaderds on this item.

Meaderds said that UC2B has close to 1100 subscribers for single-owner premises. MDU agreements will hopefully be sent out soon, perhaps by the end of this week. There is hope that this will increase numbers with large apartment complexes. The last pass with door-to-door efforts for getting subscriptions has been finalized. Placing door hangers at all unsubscribed residences has also been completed and postcards were sent this week. A newsletter will also be going out by mail and email about an update on UC2B happenings. UC2B ambassadors have also been at several community events for customer acquisition and outreach to spread the word. On November 10 there are plans for a ribbon cutting event on behalf of community anchor institutions, which will take place at Salem Baptist Church.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for questions.

Feinen said she saw lots of canvassers and signs over the weekend and congratulated Meaderds.

Resnick asked if we are up to 1100, do MDUs count as individual hookups?

Legner said yes.

Resnick asked how many MDUs we are going after.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson said part of the question is whether it is the building or the unit. Smeltzer said this depends on how the landlord wants to treat their property. If a landlord buys only one connection from UC2B, that counts as one connection. If they put fiber into eight (8) units, that counts as eight (8) connections. UC2B could end up with far more users than official customers which would be counted by NTIA. The goal is to have 2700 subscribers throughout the whole project, and we are not quite to 50% of that goal.

Resnick asked if we have any idea how many currently unconnected buildings might want a connection?



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LaEisha said this number will become clearer over the next few weeks.

Bogan commented on the November 10 ribbon cutting event. CTC is a sponsor and other sponsors are currently be sought. He said full participation from the Policy Committee is expected.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked if the Committee should save the date for November 10, and if so, roughly what time?

Legner and staff will notice the 11/10 and 12/1 meetings as community civic events pursuant to Open Meetings Act requirements.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson said that once people are plugged in, word of mouth is very powerful with positive recognition and it brings a whole new wave of people.

Smeltzer said currently installed number is up to 85.

Folk said it is actually about 100. Remaining 15 have not had grass seed put down.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for further canvassing questions. There were none.

Chair Bowersox-Johnson asked for Committee member comments.

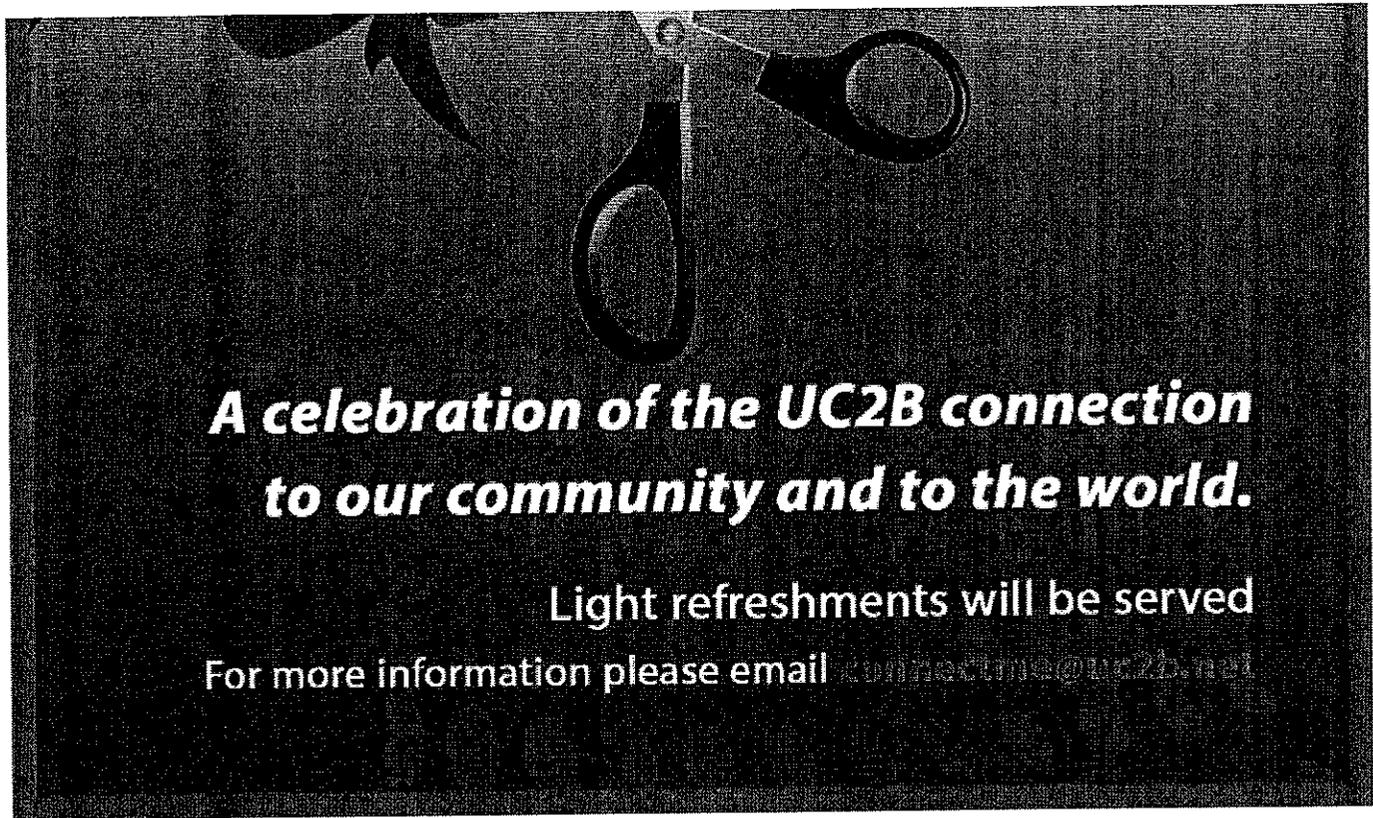

Note # 5 - Private VLANs are used for connecting multiple locations of an organization to each other. This is sometimes referred to as "Metro Ethernet". There is no Internet or Community Intranet connectivity included in the Private VLAN Service. In this model, organizations would typically centralize Internet connectivity, and then use the Private VLAN to distribute Internet and organizational data to and from all remote locations.
